You Can Now Play Video Games with Vapes



Vape manufacturers are now creating e-cigarettes that double as gaming devices. New vaping devices now have HD displays with built-in games. One example of these devices is the Craftbox V-play by Big D

Vapor. Dubbed as a "Vapentertainment system," it features three built-in retro games resembling Pac-Man, Tetris, and a fighter jet game. Aside from its games, the device also features 20,000 puffs, 22 flavors, and a price tag of \$18.

The combination of nicotine and popular youth behaviors, like video gaming or screen use, raises concerns that these products will increase the number of youths who start vaping. It also reinforces vaping among those youth who are already using. <u>Full Article.</u>

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New Kid on the Block: Nicotine Pouches

Every year, big tobacco companies come up with new products to attract people to buy from them. With all the products containing addictive nicotine, it ensures that they have a constant supply of users. In recent months, a new product has become popular: nicotine pouches.

What are nicotine pouches?

Nicotine pouches are a form of smokeless tobacco. These are microfiber pouches that contain flavored nicotine powder.

How does it work?

Users put the pouches in their mouth to dissolve the nicotine and absorb it in their system.

What do they look like?

Zyn, currently the most popular brand, is packaged to look like chewing gum. They also come in different flavors like fruit, mint, licorice, and others.

Is it safe?

Any form of nicotine is not safe for developing children. Our brains continue to develop until we are 25 years old. Nicotine exposure can affect brain development negatively.

Nicotine pouches in the market currently contain between two and 12 mg of nicotine. For reference, a cigarette contains 12 mg of nicotine on average.

What are the health effects?

Because nicotine pouches are relatively new to the market, only a few studies have been made to study its health effects. However, we do know that nicotine can negatively affect brain development in the youth.

How are nicotine pouches regulated?

Currently, nicotine pouches are not as tightly regulated as other tobacco products. In Texas across the U.S., children under the age of 21 are not allowed to purchase or use any tobacco products.

Effectiveness of Text Support for Smoking Cessation in Pregnancy



Researchers from the UK analyzed a textbased digital

cessation program for pregnant women called MiQuit. MiQuit is low-cost text messaging support based in the UK and specifically designed to help pregnant women quit smoking. It is a 12-week program that sends tailored self-help text messages.

A randomized clinical trial was used to determine how effective the program is. Results showed an increase in self-reported abstinence at four weeks but not for long-term abstinence. The study also found that those with higher motivations to quit had better self-reported outcomes in late pregnancy.

"Hacked" Vape Devices Raise Concern for Safety



Yale Department of Psychiatry recently published a paper where they surveyed young adults on how they modify or "hack" their electronic cigarette devices. Of the

1,018 young adults, 40.1% reported refilling disposable devices that were meant to be thrown out after use. There were also some who would recharge batteries of these disposable devices (35.8%). Some even reported mixing THC into the devices or e-liquids.

These practices raise concern for health and safety, especially for young adults. Not long ago, e-cigarette or vaping-associated lung injury (EVALI) became a huge problem for those who used vapes containing cannabis. Modifications of electronic cigarette devices by young adults may result to the same effect if not addressed.
