## Background on Hemp Regulation in Texas

### **Legislative History**

- 2018: Federal Farm Bill de-coupled definition of hemp from marijuana, allowing for more widespread production.
- 2019: Texas HB 1325 (86-R) granted DSHS authority to regulate the manufacture, distribution, and sale of consumable hemp products (CHP).
- 2020: Consumable Hemp Program rules created by DSHS.



# Regulatory Limit for Consumable Hemp

- Delta-9 THC may not exceed 0.3% for hemp and hemp products.
- No other THC variation including Delta-8 THC is addressed in state or federal statute.
- CHPs are regulated as food if they comply with definition of hemp.
- All other hemp products (including Delta-9 THC > 0.3%) are considered controlled substances under Texas Controlled Substances Act (Health and Safety Code Chapter 481).



# DSHS Consumable Hemp and Beverages (Alcoholic and Non-Alcoholic)

### License versus Registration

#### CHP License

- Manufacturing/processing of CHP into beverages (alcoholic or non-alcoholic) in Texas is allowed
- Mixing CHP into a drink at a bar requires a license
- TABC permits the alcohol operations

### • Retail Hemp Registration

- Retail sale of finished-product CHP manufactured by other businesses
- If a bar simply sells packaged CHP without opening, a CHP registration is sufficient
- TABC permits the alcohol operations



# DSHS Consumable Hemp Program Operations

### **Inspect and Test**

- Inspect: Random inspection of retail registrants began in early 2021
  - Inspectors collected product samples
- **Test:** Performed by a contract laboratory
  - Samples tested for Delta-9 THC and randomly tested for pesticides, heavy metals, bacteria, and other analytes



### **CHP Licensees by the Numbers**

CHP Manufacturers (CH Product License)	Retail Hemp Registrations	Retail Locations
706	4,647	8,333*

<sup>\*</sup>Registrants can have more than one location under their registration.

### **Consumable Hemp Program Staff**

- 2 licensing specialists and 4 sanitarians
  - Supported by revenue from CHP licensing fees
- DSHS Rider 32 (88R) allows up to 6 additional staff commensurate with revenue growth
  - DSHS hiring the following new program staff:
    - Manager (Hired Oct 2024)
    - Licensing specialist
    - 4 sanitarians



### **Inspection Frequency**

- Currently every 5 years
  - Additional sanitarians may reduce time between inspections
- Factors impacting inspection frequency:
  - Number of DSHS sanitarians available for inspections
  - Increasing number of retail locations
  - Size of manufacturing firms
  - Number and severity of deficiencies found during inspections
